

EQUITY IN EDUCATION - FROM RESEARCH TO ACTION

If you came to our School/Housing Network Meeting back in February of this year you would have heard about some of the key findings of this years K-12 Report.

Building Changes are proud to present further findings from that report in our Equity in Education - From Research to Action webinar on April 3rd at 12:30 and we would love to see you there! Here is the Registration Link.

Building Changes' K-12 report provides a comprehensive overview of the trends, characteristics, and academic outcomes of students experiencing homelessness in Washington state. By analyzing school-level data from OSPI, we provide detailed insights that are not typically available at the statewide level. This includes disaggregated data on specific student groups—such as graduation rates for students in doubled-up living situations—allowing for a more nuanced understanding of their experiences.

At Building Changes, we center racial equity in our work and recognize that homelessness disproportionately affects students of color. While public data sources provide general figures, they often fail to capture the complexities of students' experiences. Our report fills this gap by breaking down data across race, ethnicity, geography, grade level, and living situations. The needs of a Latine 10thgrader living unsheltered in a rural area differ significantly from those of an Alaskan Native firstgrader in a doubled-up situation in a city. Without this level of detail, policymakers and educators risk overlooking the unique barriers students face. In our current political climate, protections for these students—and the data that highlight their struggles are at risk. Transparent, disaggregated data is not just a collection of numbers; it is a lifeline that ensures students experiencing homelessness remain visible. By equipping school district administrators, educators, and policymakers with this information, we can better tailor services, allocate resources effectively, and drive equitable systems change to support students in achieving stability and academic success.
